Dear Family Members,

As a lifelong Maryland resident I'm still amazed at the weather and probably say so way too often. A few weeks back I was in the process of writing about how fortunate we had been in escaping the heat and humidity so far this summer. Two days after finishing my observations, the Heat Index was topping 104 for several days and the heat was oppressive for weeks. So many of my plants that were lush from the abundance of spring rain had the life drained out by the heat. During that stretch of time my car thermometer registered 107 degrees Fahrenheit. When it topped out I carefully pulled into a parking lot and took a picture of the temperature. I did the same thing when it registered -1 in February of 2015. Two extremes I had never seen and I can safely say I'll be okay if I never see them again. Each time the extremes happened I had heard the forecast. I knew they were coming but I really wasn't prepared. With all the technology available today to the different "expert" weather services and even with hearing what was waiting for me I wasn't truly prepared. I did the best I could to get ready but I wasn't. Some things we just can't be prepared for.

Some of you may have seen the video or heard about the devastating flood that ravaged Ellicott City, a local historic town, a little over a week ago. It truly was the perfect storm of rain and geography that caused two people to lose their lives and so many of the buildings in the downtown area to possibly be condemned or need rebuilding. Portions of the streets were washed away in mere minutes as well. The forecast for rain was there but there was no way to be prepared for all of what came with it. Rebuilding, if possible, may take years. One of most compelling videos taken while cars were being washed down the street towards the river was of folks forming a human chain to help someone out of their car to safety. People who didn't even know each other were giving a living life line to someone they may have never even seen before. Why did they help? It was because someone was in desperate need and she had little to no hope of surviving without extended hands. These caring folks were brought together by something that was out of their control but decided to get thru this as community. This so reminded me of what we do at TCF. As the Compassionate Friends Credo says, "We come together from all walks of life, from many different circumstances." It's so true. Each one of our stories differs from those next to us but we've decided to do this together, extending hands and voices of hope. We acknowledge that we weren't prepared for this but, "We are all seeking and struggling to build a future for ourselves, but we are committed to building a future together." And together we can.

One of the reasons it's taken me a while to get this Newsletter out was because of having to share sad news about one of our family members and very dear friends of mine. Linda and Howard Wade have been a very important part of our chapter as Facilitators and Howard being our Treasurer. They joined us after the loss of their son, Jeffery in 2005. Howard and Linda had already experienced the loss of granddaughters Michelle Celeste in 1989 and Rachael Marie in 1991. If you've attended a meeting in the past 10 years, you know The Wades. On July 10, 2016, Linda's battle with cancer came to an end. The last meeting they were able to attend with consistency was in February 2015 but they were able to surprise everyone and join us October of that same year. Up until this past Candlelight Memorial, Howard and Linda would sponsor and take care of the reception afterward. We were so glad that she had the strength to just join us that evening and if you wouldn't have known she had cancer you wouldn't have been able to tell. She definitely brought a light into any room she entered. The Wade's have an amazing and wonderful family who truly find "their faith to be a source of strength." They have a closeness and love that reminds me of how families should be but far too many aren't. Howard told me he plans to return to the meetings in September and his granddaughter Shelby Lynne let me know that she'll be with him. We've reprinted Reflections, an article from Linda and Howard for you. Linda will be missed by all.

Linda and I have had the wonderful opportunity to spend a couple weeks at our cabin in West Virginia during late September and early October of this year. As many of you know we built the cabin about a year following the death of our Son Jeff. He was a single man and his Mom and I were the recipients of his life insurance and retirement funds. For many years we had a camper on the property and Jeff so loved going there and spending time enjoying the outdoors. He loved to cook over the open fire outside, so we took his funds and built a cabin in his memory that can be used for years to come by his two brothers and their family. The cabin sets on two acres of wooded land that was a part of Linda's home place. One of the summers that Jeff was there he built a fireplace outside out of rocks he gathered up from around the property, and that's where he would cook breakfast from. When we built the cabin the fireplace had to be moved. I was able to relocate it and use all the original stones Jeff had gathered, but no one cooks breakfast over the fire any longer. We do enjoy building a fire and setting around it in the evenings and enjoying hot dogs, pies done in pie irons and good family conversation. While there this time I hung a storage pouch of Jeff's that I keep not knowing really what I was going to do with it and now it has found a new home in my shed. There are so many memories of Jeff there and we enjoy every one of them while we are there. His picture hangs on the wall in the great room of the cabin, his gun and holster hangs on the wall and several boxes and mementos set on the floor under his picture. It is only a short ride from the cabin to the cemetery where he was laid to rest and when we go there is seems so unreal to see his name engraved on that

NATIONAL BEREAVED PARENTS MONTH

July is recognized as National Bereaved Parents Month. The loss of a child is the most inconsolable of losses to deal with. It violates the natural order of things and it's not fair for an innocent to see their dreams unfulfilled. As parents, we feel we are solely responsible for the well-being of our children and we may feel like we have failed and let our child down. There are so many expressions of grief after the loss of a child that often it is hard to sort out how a bereaved parent is really coping. These are a few of the expressions described at http://www.kulkkula.com/bereavementawareneess/parents.htm:

Why?: "WHY" seems to need to be asked repeatedly in an effort to make sense of the loss.

helpful to cry to release all that pent-up emotion. Physical Symptoms: The bereaved parent may lack or have an increase of appetite; sleeplessness or oversleeping; knot or emptiness in pit of stomach; tightness in throat; shaky legs; headaches; trembling; chills; fatigue; chest pains; general achiness; difficulty swallowing and/or speaking; digestive disorders (indigestion, nausea, diarrhea); feeling weak or Repetition: The bereaved parent may repeat the same things to the same people. Reality of Death: This is a frightening time as it may seem as if the bereaved parent is going backwards.

Confusion: The simplest decisions may seem impossible and the bereaved parent may have difficulty concentrating.

faint; tension; slower in speech or movement; temporary paralysis of limb or sight.

Denial: The bereaved parent may subconsciously be searching for their child

when out in a crowd or when they open the Idealization: The bereaved parent may only see their child as perfect and may compare themselves or others to that loved one. Identification: The bereaved parent may seek to identify with their child by wearing their clothes or taking up a sport they liked. Anxiety/Panic: The bereaved parent may fear being alone or be worried about the future. They may feel like they are losing control or are "going crazy."

Bargaining: The parent may try to bargain with God that "things will be different;" or that they will try to be a better person if only their child can be alive again.

Depression: Sometimes the bereaved parent may hurt so much that they just don't care about anything. It may be an effort just to get out of bed, to shop, or fix a simple meal. Relief (Laughter): This phase comes and goes and the bereaved parent may be able to recall the fun times.

Lowered Self-Esteem: A bereaved parent's confidence is often undermined.

Preoccupation: The bereaved parent may think of nothing but the loss. Guilt: Bereaved parents tend to blame themselves for something they did or didn't do that may have contributed to the death, or for things that wished that they had done for their child. Anger: Anger is normal. Pushing down anger is harmful.

Loneliness: The bereaved parent may feel intense loneliness due to the absence of their child, because they are unable to share thoughts and feelings, to touch, or to be understood. Despair: The bereaved parent may feel as if there would be little difference if they lived or died. They may have suicidal thoughts. Sadness: These feelings seem to pervade their life.

Helplessness: The bereaved parent may feel that they are unable to help themselves or others cope, or get better. Envy: They may feel jealous of people who still have their child.

Frustration: They may be disappointed that they are not coping as well as everyone thinks they should.

Resentment/Bitterness/Hatred: Bereaved parents may feel resentful about the death and their changed circumstances. Limbo: The bereaved parent may reach an inbetween point between the reality of death and the point where life seems worthwhile again. Hope Emerges: The good days outbalance the bad days and they may feel encouraged that they will get better. Missing: The bereaved parent will always miss their child and special events may trigger the feeling of longing even more.

Struggle with New Life Patterns: The bereaved parent starts to rebuild a new life that will be different but can be enjoyed. Life is Worth Living: Eventually the bereaved parent may be able to think and talk about their child with happiness and a sense of peace. Pride: The bereaved parent may overcompensate for how they are really feeling or may not ask for help and can complicate the grief process.
